Photos too good to keep hidden

SETTING a solid grounding for new careers has been a snap for 11 Moreland youths.

Krinkle Max boasts newly arrived students who are doing "some extraordinary things", producing multimedia, artwork and photography that are on exhibition at Coburg's Oxygen Youth Centre.

The pieces have been produced through the VIC-

SEG New Futures Youth and Multimedia project, a collaboration between Brunswick based YouthWorx, which works with at-risk youths, and Inner North Community Foundation, which provides funding for pathways for your people. Co-ordinator Sue Paten said the program had revealed some previously hidden talents.

"The students are learn-

ing skills in photography, media and radio and also gaining peer friendships," Ms Paten said. "This is the culmination of their work."

The pieces were so good that organisers decided to exhibit them.

"We got all of their photographs together and decided they were too good not to show them off," Ms Paten said.

"It is a snapshot into the

lives of young people involved. It is principally a photographic exhibition.

"It is also about their self-esteem, to show them off in front of the peers and families. They are very excited."

The exhibition opened on Friday and will show until November 15 at Oxygen Youth Centre, 4-8 Gaffney St, Coburg.
